

Great Barrier Reef Trip CAIRNS – Saturday 15 August 2009

What is it?

This is full day trip to the uninhabited Frankland Islands. The Great Barrier Reef will provide a fantastic setting for the event. Stuart Kininmonth, from the Australian Institute of Marine Science, will present on applications of spatial technologies pertinent to the area. There will also be plenty of time for networking, snorkelling and enjoying the natural beauty of an uninhabited tropical island.

Although a SSSI YP is someone who is a member of the Surveying & Spatial Sciences Institute aged under 36 at the time of registration, attendance is open to anyone who is interested. The event has been timed to occur the day after the Fungis/SSSI YP conference in Cairns, allowing those who have travelled to Cairns for the conference to gain even more value from their time in the area.

Due to the limited capacity of the vessel, participant numbers are limited, so please register early to avoid disappointment.

3.5 SSSI CPD points have been allocated for the event.

When is it?

Saturday 15th August, from 7:40am until 5:00pm-5:30pm.

Where is it?

The pickup point is from Cairns Central YHA, 20-26 McLeod St Cairns. Free car parking is available at Cairns Central Shopping Centre (opposite). We travel by bus to Deeral, and then by boat to Normanby Island.

How much is it?

Registration costs \$135 for SSSI YPs and \$145 for everyone else. The registration fee covers the presentation, all transport, a tropical buffet lunch, a glass bottom boat cruise and all snorkelling equipment.

What should I bring?


You'll need to bring sunscreen, a hat, swimwear and some comfortable shoes for beachcombing.

He lay there all warm and happy, and soon began to sing for joy.


A passing cat heard the bird singing and came to investigate.
