## Mareeba Wetlands Workshop this year.

At the 2002 Annual Directions workshop of the FUNGIS Annual General Meeting (AGM), members told their Executive Committee that the Mareeba Wetlands Workshop was one of their highest priorities.

Since then the Executive have been working to win the trust of the Wetlands Foundation Committee and to ensure that any work done by FUNGIS would be worthwhile to the Wetlands Management.

After months of hard work, we have made a major breakthrough.

The FUNGIS Executive and Wetlands Foundation held a very successful meeting in Mareeba earlier this month to discuss potential project ideas and processes for implementing them.

Potential project ideas for fieldwork in the Mareeba Wetlands include: -

- Assessment of overgrazing and woody thickening
- Fine scale vegetation mapping and monitoring
- Mapping of infrastructure
- Fire Management
- Erosion gullies and Soils mapping
- Mapping of revegetation projects

## Unification of AURISA, IEMSA, ISA, MSIA and RSPAA

For more than two years, the Spatial Sciences Coalition (SSC) has been working on a proposal for the unification of AURISA, IEMSA, ISA, MSIA and RSPAA into one national body to provide for the professional development of all practitioners in the spatial information industry.

In October 2002, the SSC brought all the material together in an exposure draft of the proposal that was then sent to all members of the five institutions for comment. The SSC met in Adelaide, during AURISA/ISA Conference, on 27 November to discuss the responses received.

What were the main issues raised by respondents to the exposure draft?

Fees. For the members of some institutions, the proposed scale of fees for the SSI represents a substantial increase in annual fees. Most recognize that the proposed scale of fees is similar to the fees paid by members of other professional institutions and accept that they may have to accept an increase in fees to ensure that the SSI is viable. But they want assurance that the services received represent value-for-money.

At the other end of the spectrum, for some members (e.g. members of the NSW Division of ISA) proposed scale of fees

represents a significant reduction in fees and they are skeptical that there will be sufficient revenue for the SSI to provide the services they have been accustomed

**Business Model.** Some respondents observed that we have provided a lot of detail about how the SSI will operate at the national level but scant regard has been given to how it will operate at the regional level.

Winding Management of **Existing** Assets. Some existing organizations have substantial physical and financial assets and members are concerned that the new national body will







appropriate simply those assets.

**Development** the Constitution. Α basic constitution has been adopted to enable the SSI to be registered as a Company Limited by Guarantee. When the membership has agreed the business model proposed and a National Board has been established, steps will be taken to amend the Constitution and prepare Regulations to reflect the agreed governance administrative model. Of course, any changes to the Constitution will be taken to a General Meeting of the new institution. This process will be explained better in the final proposal.

**Professionalism Recognition.** There is a concern among some groups that the new institution will not be recognized as a "professional body". problem arises from our objective of ensuring that the SSI should not present a barrier to any person interested in the spatial information sciences from becoming a member. At the same time we want to provide for the professional development and recognition of our members. It is an attempt to combine the best features of AURISA and **RSPAA** with the best features of MSIA, IEMSA

and ISA, hopefully without losing any of the desirable features.

Timetable. The revised timetable is as follows:

- During December and January, individual members of the SSC will revise components of the proposal, for finalizing in late January.
- The documentation will be distributed members February
- The vote will be conducted in March
- The result of poll will then be declared in late

# HRIC hosts resource information conference for GIS users

Once again the Herbert Resource Information Centre will host a GIS Users Group Conference which will enable GIS and related professionals to see fresh and interesting applications of GIS in particular on the theme of spatial solutions for sustainability.

The HRIC is a collaborative resource information centre that was set up in Ingham in 1996. Involving six partners from the community, industry and government, the HRIC provides access to a range of information to organisations and individuals to assist better resource planning and management in the Herbert River catchment.

Manager of the HRIC, Raymond De Lai said the program is a very fresh one with presentations on a range of new topics that attendees would not have seen before.

"Various speakers from all over Australia will be presenting the views and uses of GIS and spatial analysis from an organisation's perspective," said Mr De Lai. "The conference is not limited to GIS as a technology but focuses on the application of GIS for a community or regional benefit."

The first day of the conference is based on local presentations from the Herbert region. This will provide the opportunity to see how, ten years after its inception, the HRIC operates to brings benefits to the Herbert community

Day two is an exciting line up of presentations from other groups and regions in Australia to demonstrate how they are using GIS for specific projects related to community or regional planning.

The final day of the conference is a cruise up the world famous Hinchinbrook channel, which will enable participants to see some of the local area and also speak informally with most of the presenters.

The conference, to be held in Ingham on 11-13 March 2003, is expected to be well attended – when the first HRIC users conference was held four years ago it attracted more than 120 people and since then there has been growing interest in the Centre and its achievements.

Prior to the conference is a community Open Day on 10 March for the people of the Herbert region to see how the HRIC technology is being used for their benefit.
