STOP PRESS: State Digital Road Network coverage improvement through refinement project. The next phase of the project will involve 10 Local Governments in the far north of the State – Atherton, Cairns City, Cook, Croydon, Douglas, Eacham, Etheridge, Herberton, Johnstone and Mareeba. STOP PRESS: QId Health begins GIS project.

The aim of the new project "Evaluation of the utility of Geographic Information Systems (GIS) within Public Health Services (PHS)" is to "investigate the utility of GIS to improve service delivery within PHS around the areas of vector control and other Communicable Disease Control issues, environmental health legislative responses and the population targeting of non communicable disease intervention programmes"

This 9 month position will be filled by Alistair Hart and he will no doubt be in touch with a few data custodians around Far North Qld in an attempt to identify desirable geocodable datasets that may assist the above project.

Public Works has recently published the revised Queensland Government Information Standard - IS 34 Metadata -

http://www.iie.qld.gov.au/site/informationstandards/standards/IS34%20v2.asp.

IS34 requires 'Queensland Government agencies to apply consistent descriptions and classification of information resources through the implementation of metadata' including to whole-of-Govt metadata repositories such as the Register of Strategic Information.

Briefing sessions on the new standard will be provided by Public Works later in the year.

TNQIT - TAFE

Continues its success in

Spatial Education

Tropical North Queensland Institute of TAFE Atherton Campus, has continued its success in the delivery of the Accredited Certificate III in Spatial Information Services and Diploma of Spatial Information Services through RPL (Recognition of Prior Learning).

Recently TNQIT have reaffirmed its support to the development of this industry and its quality training options, through the appointment of Spatial Project Development Officer, Justine De Boom. It is Justine's role to identify new opportunities for training delivery in the Spatial and GIS fields. Justine will also be involved in the ongoing development of resources for training delivery to ensure that they are best practice within the industry and make strategic linkages with industry stakeholders for future developments.

The key aim for 2005 for TNQIT is to have the resources in place to offer the Diploma in Spatial Information Services. Industry stakeholders identified this as a key aim to ensure that industry is embracing a continuous learning culture.

Most recently in September the second group of spatial students commenced their residential workshop at Atherton TAFE campus. The workshop is critical for the students to gain hands on experience using GPS, software applications and the further fine tuning of their mapping and digitising skills. The remainder of the course is covered by blended delivery such as on-line learning.

Due to industry demand, TNQIT in partnership with @GIS are looking to further develop their short course range in GIS and Spatial areas. The focus on training will incorporate several types of customised training, hands-on workshops and seminars to help you get the most out of GIS and Spatial Information. Our training sessions range from introductory programs for new users to detailed multi-day workshops for professionals.

To help ensure that educational pathways meet industry needs TNQIT are developing a forum for industry input into the relevance and structure of programs offered at all educational levels.

It is intended for the "Spatial Information Systems Industry Liaison Group" to meet quarterly with the first meeting to be held before the end of the 2004 calendar year. An overview of this liaison group is also included in this edition of FunGISNews.

- 3. Industry Input

<u>Size</u>	Ideally between 8-10 for manageability, to a maximum of 20 participants
<u>Membership</u>	It is expected that the reference group would seek to have selected industry representatives from a diverse group to ensure that fair and equitable representation is achieved. An update from the Qld Spatial Information Infrastructure Strategy (QSIIS) Information Office (QIO)

State Digital Road Network coverage improved through refinement project

The State Digital Road Network Refinement project was established by the Queensland Spatial Information Infrastructure Council to validate the existing SDRN road centrelines. These were originally established by various means, including the collapsing of road casements in the Digital Cadastral Dataset (DCS).

The QSIIC approved project is a collaborative effort between the QSIIS Information Office, the Department Of Main Roads and MapInfo. Through consultation with local governments, the project is removing unconstructed roads from the network, adding additional roads – including private roads where available, correcting realignment differences and validating naming of the SDRN road network.

Phase 1 of the project (now completed) involved working with Councils in the central Queensland region. The current phase involves seven Councils in the North West /Gulf region of the State – Burke, Carpentaria, Cloncurry, Flinders, McKinlay, Mount Isa and Richmond. Updates from these Councils are expected be included in the December release of the SDRN.

The next phase of the project will involve 10 Councils in the far north of the State – Atherton, Cairns City, Cook, Croydon, Douglas, Eacham, Etheridge, Herberton, Johnstone and Mareeba.

The results to date indicate an average 20% improvement in the definition of the rural road network.

QSIIS expands service delivery to regional Queensland

This new service arrangement was instigated between QIO and OESR to ensure QSIIS is able to deliver its services regionally. There are now offices in Cairns, Townsville, Rockhampton and Brisbane. So why not contact your nearest regional liaison officer and explore how the services being offered can add to your business.

The QIO would like to extend its sincere thanks to Geoff Hunter who was the Cairns Regional Liaison Officer for his invaluable contributions to QSIIS over the past 3 years. Geoff is now working in the Queensland Department of Natural Resources and Mines.

The QIO also welcomes Liesl Harrold to the Regional Liaison role in the Cairns office. Liesl has worked with OESR for over four years in the same role based in Rockhampton and brings a wealth of knowledge and experience to the Cairns office.

Review develops strategy to address spatial imagery coordination

Following a recent review by QSIIS of spatial imagery use and management in Queensland a series of recommendations have been made to QSIIC, in particular the need for whole-of-government coordination of spatial imagery acquisition and licensing.

The review was conducted in partnership with GeoImage Pty Ltd and Spatial 3i Pty Ltd. The QSIIC endorsed report of Spatial Imagery Use & Management in Queensland Government is available from the QSIIS website under the Publications > Reports section.

Following the review, the Queensland Department of Natural Resources and Mines has been appointed the lead agency for spatial imagery management in Queensland. As part of their role as spatial image coordinator, NR&M will be responsible for developing a five year Acquisition Plan.

New OESR website provides smarter access to information about Queensland

The Office of Economic and Statistical Research has recently launched a new website featuring an exciting range of new functions to provide smarter access to information about Queensland and areas of the state.
